

Leadership at Yorkshire 2024

As we enter the New Year, I would like to acknowledge that during our Church Conference the following leaders were accepted by the Yorkshire Church members. In the role of Administrative Council Chair, Joe Blackwood will be taking the reigns as Jim Valentine hands them to him after a very fruitful 6-year term; a term that successfully navigated many changes at Yorkshire Church. Joe begins his role as Ad Chair as he hands over the reigns of our Staff Parish Relations responsibilities to Randy Fry. I look forward to working with Randy and I believe his experience in HR (Human Relations) leadership in the corporate world will afford our staff and teams great benefit!

The other leadership transition that has taken place is in our Trustees responsibilities. Josh Strange is handing the responsibilities over to Eric Adamson who has been a dedicated member of the Trustee team for a few years. Josh will continue to support the Trustee and church maintenance efforts as he has served the church as Trustee chair for the past two years. If you have been around Yorkshire for these past two to three years, you know that they have been years of great facility and maintenance improvement- all which Josh's leadership has been an instrumental element in their success!

Third is our Missions and Outreach Team; "Outreach." This team focuses on our outreach programs in two basic categories, outreach to our Yorkshire Church fellowship and direct neighborhood community, and outreach to our missionaries beyond our church community. The focus is based on Acts 1:8,

"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

As Yorkshire Church, we consider the "Jerusalem" aspect of this verse to be our local church and community. This includes events such as Rally Day, Trunk or Treat, Christmas Fun Days and even activities such as Hanging of the Greens, etc. We consider Judea and Samaria to be missions throughout the region and country such as our support to LifePath, and Micah Ruch (Cru) at West Chester State University. We look at our overseas missions' support as fulfilling "the ends of the earth," which include our support of Rebecca Jacobs (Time Ministries), Kim Knaub (Pioneers) and Henry Hauser (Literacy for All). Our leaders in this area of our church are:

Rounding out our leadership team are the Lay Leader and Members at Large which provide support to all aspects of our leadership team while representing the voice of the fellowship. While the members at large represent the church fellowship to the leadership team, The Lay Leader provides direct support to the "Operations" aspect of the leadership while also being a direct representative of the overall church to leadership as well as the Susquehanna Conference of the United Methodist Church.

Finally, is the Lay Member to annual conference who gets to represent all things Yorkshire to the Annual Conference of the Susquehanna Conference- a multi-day meeting held in the May/June timeframe each year to conduct the conference level business that is required.
